Visits to five gardens that are included in the pre/post tours were a highlight to visit as we travelled from Fukuyama to Tokyo. Our hosts are planning a wonderful convention, with many highlights, so make sure you have this convention in your diary for 2025.

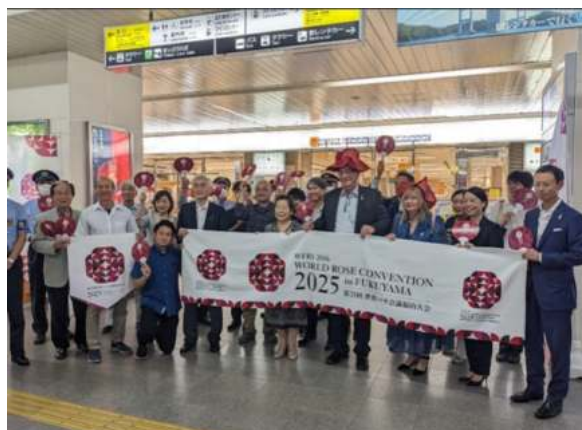

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S MESSAGE

Christmas Day draws the contrasts of seasonal climatic conditions experienced by our various Member Countries. In the southern hemisphere, warm tropical climates bring forth the rose to its peak of perfection, whereas here in the northern hemisphere, our gardens remain dormant, with any current weather-beaten rose blooms covered by a light dusting of glistening frost. The 21st day of December marks the commencement of the Winter Solstice, where daylight gradually increases, and plant life begins to be steadily awakened.

Holly, ivy and mistletoe are evergreen plants that are closely associated with the festivities, which became very popular during Victorian times. Greenery was originally used by the Pagans during the winter solstice celebrations to ward off evil spirits and celebrate new growth. They believed that holly was a symbol of masculinity and ivy represented the fairer sex. The Druids regarded holly as an attribute of fertility and eternal life, which Christians eventually adopted as a true symbol for Christmas. There's an old English tradition from the Midlands, which states that whichever plant enters the house first during wintertime will dictate whether males or females rule the home for the following year – although bringing either inside before Christmas Eve, is thought to be unlucky by many European countries.

For the romantic hearted, kissing under a sprig of mistletoe has added some spice to the proceedings. It is a wholly British custom which began in the 1700's and was once an indication of a marriage proposal!

England's County of Somerset is the home of the world-famous Holy Thorn Tree of Glastonbury. The first tree was planted during the arrival of Christianity in Britain, and appeared in many historical handwritten texts since medieval times. The current tree is an offshoot from the original sapling, which is reputed to flower on Christmas Day. This remarkable phenomenon is regarded as a miracle by some folk, when hawthorns normally flower during the month of May. On manifestation, the vicar of the Parish of Glastonbury, sends a flowering sprig to grace the Christmas dinner table of the reigning British monarch.

Plants, whether it be the rose or otherwise, continue to give us hope and joy during these challenging times.

Wherever you reside, and whatever plant life will enrich your festivities; I wish you all a very Happy Christmas and a prosperous New Year.

WFRS VICE PRESIDENT REPORT

Inger Schierning, Denmark, WFRS Vice President Northern Europe

Editor: We decided to move this Vice President Report up in World Rose News as it contains information about the upcoming WFRS Regional Convention and Heritage Roses Conference in Kalmar, Sweden.

My report today will focus on some of the highlights in the 15 months since my last report in World Rose News in the September 2022 edition with updates on the Kalmar Convention in July 2024.

At the 19th World Rose Convention in Adelaide from October 27th to November 4th 2022, Svein Osen, president the Swedish Rose Society, Michael Luther president the Rose Society of Finland and I manned a booth where we introduced the WFRS Regional Convention and Heritage Roses Conference "Nordic Roses 2024", taking place in Kalmar Sweden from July 2nd – 6th with the pre-tour to Finland starting June 25th and post tour to Norway until July 14th.

It was a pleasure to meet and talk to international rose friends again. Many spoke excitedly about their experience of the 18th WRC "A Fairytale of Roses" in 2018 and made no secret of the fact that they would like to come back to the Nordics if the opportunity arose.

Svein Osen and I have been working in close cooperation to ensure Nordic Roses 2024 will be a fantastic once in a lifetime adventure for rose lovers from near and far away. Years of volunteer work have been invested in creating this truly magical experience.

In early June 2023 at the 15th Heritage Rose Conference in Brussels, the "The Swedish Team" (Lars-Åke Gustavsson, Torben Thim, Svein Osen, Christina Högardh-Ihr and I) were on stage to present Nordic Roses 2024. The same day the new website www.nordicroses2024.com was launched. On August 25th, registration opened, handled by Christina and her company The Green Guide.

At the end of June, the Nordic Rose Society hosted a rose conference in Kalmar, Sweden. Kalmar is a small, charming town by the sea with just over 36,000 inhabitants. Its history goes back a 1000 years and the city's landmark is the Kalmar Castle from the 13th century.

The five Nordic rose societies take turns every second year to host a rose conference – this year the Swedish Rose Society was the host for a festive rose conference, where we both celebrated the 50th anniversary of the Nordic Rose Society and had a taste and glimpse of what awaits the participants at Nordic Roses 2024. We visited lovely charming private gardens and everywhere the owners were present to meet us.

Catarina Lund is the leader of the rose group SydöstRosen. We visited her country garden two miles south of Kalmar on the way to Kristianopel, which is a small idyllic town by the Baltic Sea, where rose bushes have grown at the charming and characteristic Swedish wooden houses for generations. A few years ago, Catarina took the initiative together with Rose experts to identify the many beautiful old rose bushes and place them on a city map of Kristianopel.

Here are impressions in texts and pictures from the Garden of Catarina Lund in 2023:



Catarina Lund Garden: 'Rose de Rescht' in front and in the back 'Mme Alfred Carriere'

"Our garden is at our summer cottage two miles south of Kalmar on the coast. The cottage is an old brewhouse that we built and the garden we started to develop in 2010. The plot is in an open south-facing position in the agricultural landscape. When planning the garden, we have used a "reverse" planning method by placing the flower beds in the gaps that arise between other areas such as corridors and seating areas. The focus of the garden is mainly single-blooming older roses together with suitable perennials such as daffodils, aquileges, irises, peonies, spurs, digitalis and lilies, but we also have some reblooming roses such as noisettes and tea roses. The tea roses are grown in pots and overwintered in the cottage. In total, we have between 150 and 200 kinds of roses, of which a lot are POM roses and other local hit roses, such as 'Linnés Hammarby', which were found near our plot.

We have a special interest in tea roses and have taken care of the POM (program for plant diversity) roses 'Anna-Sofia' and 'Mina' in order to preserve and propagate these roses. On the grounds there is a large bush with the stuffed cinnamon rose, which turned out to belong to the clone 'Hängers källa'. It grows under oaks and birches without any care except that we make sure it doesn't spread too much.

We have a couple of inherited roses. One is 'Blomsterhult' and the other 'Onkel Carl', which originally came from my grandmother's garden in Sörmland and my grandmother's mother's garden in Copenhagen, respectively.

We are fragrance geeks and often choose roses based on how they smell, but their expression and feel is also important. We particularly appreciate the look of roses from around the turn of the last century. The goal is to dress the cottage and the garden in roses and at the same time keep the wild feeling with a meadow that leads into the garden and contact with the open landscape.

We care about biodiversity, so we have meadow instead of mowed lawn and a wild part with trees and bushes. We have sand lizards on the property and keep sand piles especially for their hibernation and egg laying." Welcome to our garden in Hagbyhamn says Catarina Lund.

Identification of the roses along the village street in Kristianopel

In June 2021, The Rose Group SydostRosen received a question from Jämsjö Garden Society asking for help to identify the roses in Kristianopel in Blekinge, a well-visited tourist destination known for its roses, and visitors often ask for the name of the roses.

On July 9, 2021, the work of identifying the roses along Storgatan and in some accessible gardens began. The identification work continued since 2022 by inviting the members of SydostRosen to a rose walk to help with the identification. After a lot of follow-up work and research, 120 out of about 150 roses were identified. The 120 identified roses consisted of approximately 70 different varieties. Most of the roses are modern roses from the 20th century, but there are also some older roses.

Pictures and information about the roses were compiled in a document that, together with a map, can be used during rose walks. The work then led to applying for and receiving money (from, among other things, the EU's regional development support) and nameplates for the roses could be ordered. This summer, the signs are in place just in time for the Nordic Rose Conference.

We also visited the garden of Irene Nettelbrandt, north of Kalmar. Through ten years of work with Lars -Åke Gustavsson and POM, Irene has registered 60,000 tested roses for Lars-Åke Gustavsson and POM. Lars-Åke Gustavsson and Irene gave us an exciting introduction to their work.

On the island of Öland, we were welcomed to Solliden, the Swedish Royal Family's summer palace, where they spend their summer holiday every year. During Nordic Roses 2024, the Royal Family will be present and hopefully a rose will be christened for HRH. More about this and the adventurous program in future newsletters from Nordic Roses 2024.

In Denmark on August 5th and 6th, the charming town of Bogense on Funen was immersed in a world of roses. During this Rose Festival, held every year on the first weekend in August, the entire town is beautifully decorated, offering a multitude of activities. "Roses in Denmark" hosted a rose celebration at Den Gamle Købmandsgård, featuring a rose christening at the square with the statue Manneken Pis, open gardens, art exhibitions, concerts, visits to rose nurseries, guided tours to rose fields and much more.

In the city center, there were numerous large flower arrangements, mostly featuring roses, for the public to vote on. The turnout of guests was impressive. It's fantastic that a small town like Bogense can organize such an event every year.

On Sunday, August 6th, there was a grand garden party in Valbyparken. For more than 20 years we have had a prominent information stand in the midst of the rose garden. I had invited FELCO Denmark with their world-class pruning tools to exhibit at our stand. There was a rose competition, delightful music, and plenty of experiences. It was a perfect and enjoyable occasion to invite family and friends for a picnic in Copenhagen's largest park. The event was free and open to all who love gardens, roses, and green experiences under the open sky.

There was a significant interest in choosing the best rose in three categories – white, golden, and reddish roses among the many available this year. Three winners were drawn from all those who voted, receiving a garden rose from our Rose Society, Roses in

Denmark. Once again, this year's roses for the lucky winners were sponsored by the Danish Rose Breeder Rosa Eskelund, Roses-Forever.

Musical entertainment in the rose garden was provided by Trine Opsahl on the Celtic harp, and in the avenue by the opera singers, part of the Copenhagen Opera Festival. The day concluded with great dynamism, featuring everything from fiery numbers to beautiful ballads by Englishman Paul Harrison and his band. Roses in Denmark – Team Aarhus, together with Knud Pedersen invited everyone for a field trip to his nursery, Rosenposten on August 8th. Despite autumn-like August weather with rain and gusts, there was a good turnout, and it was delightful to meet new and old rose friends. As always, the hall at the nursery was beautifully decorated and Knud Pedersen shared valuable advice on rose cultivation.

From 18th August the Odense Flower Festival took place for the third time as part of the HC Andersen Festival, with booths and activities throughout the city center. This year's theme, "Let the Senses Blossom", originates from H.C. Andersen's fantastical literary work and universe. Roses in Denmark, set up in Vintapperstræde, where we shared a booth with Roses-Forever. Many people stopped by, discussing roses, buying roses, smelling the delightful rose bouquets from Roses Forever, and many joined the Roses in Denmark association. At the square in front of the City Hall, landscape architect Helle Nebelung had designed a sensory-rich garden divided into several small themed gardens.

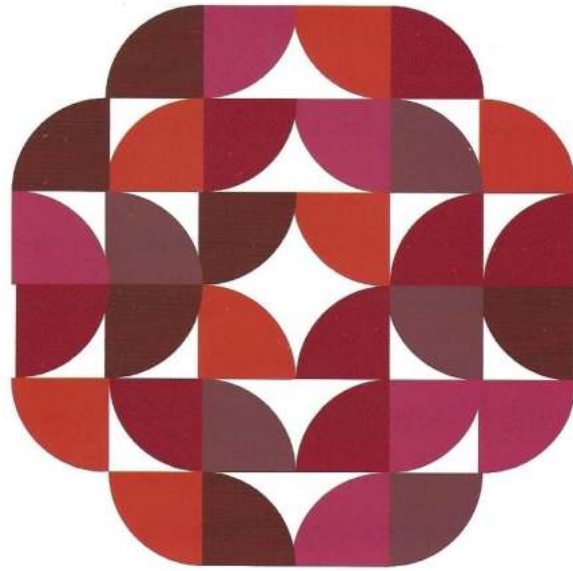

It thrives in sloping forests along riversides, with vigorously extending shoots that entangle and crawl up trees using sharp, hooked prickles. The flowers are relatively big, forming expansive, corymbose inflorescences that resemble a spectacular white waterfall cascading down the forest surface during full bloom. In Miyajima, you can see giant *Rosa sambucina* climbing up the trees. Their flowering season peaks around mid-May.

Adachi Museum of Art

Renowned for its gardens, the Adachi Museum of Art has been named the best garden in Japan annually since 2003 by the "Journal of Japanese Gardening". Spanning 16 hectares, the site includes a karesansui garden, a moss garden, a pond garden, and a white sand and green pine garden. The museum's collection features modern Japanese paintings by masters like Yokoyama Taikan and Uemura Shoen, with approximately 20 works by Taikan displayed at any time.

Yuushien Garden

Located on Daikonshima Island in Shimane Prefecture, known for its tree peony production, the 4-hectare Yushi Garden features a pond and circular garden. The garden encapsulates the topography of the Izumo region, including valleys, rivers, lakes, and the Sea of Japan's waterscape in Okuizumo. It houses 250 varieties of tree peonys and offers year-round viewing of tree peony flowers. The island is also a ginseng-growing area, and visitors can enjoy local cuisine incorporating ginseng in the garden. The park is recognized with a three-star rating by the French tourist guide Blue Guide.

Fukuyama Castle

Fukuyama Castle, built in 1622 by Mizuno Katsunari, the first daimyo of the Fukuyama domain, stands out as the only castle in Japan with an iron-plated north wall. This feature, unique to Fukuyama Castle, was designed to strengthen its northern defenses. The castle, a fine example of early modern castle architecture, originally featured a multi-leveled tower with 5 tiers and 6 floors, and an attached smaller keep. Though it was designated a National Treasure in 1931, the castle was destroyed in a 1945 air raid and later rebuilt in 1966. On its 400th anniversary in 2022, the castle was restored to its original appearance, including the unique iron-plated north wall, top-floor windows, and crenels.

WFRS VICE PRESIDENT REPORTS

Angela Bokor, Vice President, Eastern Europe



On the 3rd November 2022 I was elected as Vice President (VP) for the Central and Eastern part of Europe and I would like to express my thanks to the WFRS for entrusting me with this position. I took over from Breda Čopi who did a brilliant job as a VP before me. I am a chemical engineer by education and a long-term board member of the Romanian Rose Society.

As VP, I represent 10 countries: Austria, Czech Republic, Greece, Hungary, Israel, Poland, Russia, Romania, Slovenia and Slovakia.

NEW WFRS MEMBER

Soon after I started my term of office, I succeeded in contacting the new Slovak Rose Society and after a ten-year gap, the new team, led enthusiastically by Alenka Kratka as President and Jana Huttanova as Vice-President, was happy to rejoin the WFRS. The society is named after her, the Rose Countess, Maria Henrieta Chotek, born in 1863 in Dolna Krupa. Part of the Austro-Hungarian high aristocracy, she was a modest person dedicating all of her time to creating one of the largest rosariums in Europe at that time. Thanks to her effort, the genetic works created by Rudolf Geschwind were saved after his death in 1910, when the countess acquired the entire collection of roses and even introduced some cultivars which had not yet been on the market.

The main goal of the Slovak Rose Society is to preserve the rose varieties bred in Slovakia. Many of the cultivars are being planted in the park of the manor house in Dolna Krupa. They map the location of Slovak roses both in public in private gardens and managed to acquire the almost forgotten 'Ferka', a sport from 'Easter Morning' introduced by Michal Sekáč in 1994. And, like the countess did in the past, nowadays roses created by Szilveszter Gyory, an amateur Slovak breeder are saved by the rose society, by being planted in Dolna Krupa. As was 'Ignis' a seedling from *R. x macrantha*, found by M. H. Chotek in her rosarium and introduced in Czech Republic by Jan Böhm in 1934. Based on the manuscript of rose historian Marian Kováč, the rose society members are working on a monograph about Slovakia's rose breeders, planned to be published in 2025.

GARDEN OF EXCELLENCE AWARD

In the Arboretum Volčji Potok in Slovenia there is a professional and dedicated team which established a nice collection of both modern and historic roses, with more than 1200 cultivars and varieties. One of the goals of the collection is to gather the roses created in Central and Eastern Europe. There are four thematic rose gardens: the Upper Rose Garden with mostly modern, disease resistant varieties, a Lower Rose Garden with historic roses, then a collection of roses representing EU countries and the Papal Roses, a collection of about 60 varieties with a name related to the church (popes, saints, orders, places of pilgrimage, etc.).

Well maintained, all plants are labelled and visitors can use an interactive map to search for cultivars. I was pleased to see pupils visiting the rose garden with their teacher who talked to them about roses.

At the International Convention held in Adelaide in 2022 the Rosarium in the Arboretum was bestowed the Garden of Excellence

Award. On the 2nd of June 2023 we had the ceremony of to unveil the plaque. The event was well attended by both members of the Slovenian Rose Society and general public.

ROSE TRIALS

As you know, in our region we have two gardens where rose trials are held. In Hradec Kralove, Czech Republic, the rose garden celebrated 50 years since its inception and until 2020 was the only international trial rose garden in our region. The highest award is the *Golden Rose of Hradec Králové* and each year only one variety can receive the award. This year the winner was 'Mauritia', a shrub with pink and peach shades, strongly fragrant flowers from Tantau Roses.

Since 2020, there is a second location for rose trials in the Botanical Garden in Warsaw. This year the *Amber Rose Award* went to Kordes for 'Für Elise'. Both trials use the WFRS standard judging criteria and the results can be seen on the WFRS website.

ISRAEL

Earlier this year I contacted Dalit Kaslassi, the curator of Wohl Rose Park in Jerusalem and I was told that the garden was undergoing renovations with the rose collection changed and renewed, planning to finish by the end of 2023. I like to say that roses can make the world a better place so let's hope for the best.

RUSSIA

I have the same hopes for this rose society too. I tried several times to contact them by email but had no reply. The same with GREECE. Even by different means of contact, I have not succeeded in having any news from the rose society. In AUSTRIA the Rosarium in Doblhoffpark is well maintained and I managed to get in contact with the director of the municipality's gardens who promised to get back to me with more information. Otherwise, I have not been able to learn much about the rose society.

CZECH REPUBLIC

I have been in good contact with Rosa Klub, the Czech Rose Society which has a new president, Mr. Stanislav Konstacky. The society is active in organizing the Rose Trail in Hradec Kralove. They also had a visit from members of the Slovak Rose Society, proving once again, that through roses the best friendships are built.

SLOVENIA, under the leadership of Breda Copi and Matjaz Mastnak, has a very active rose society, organising meetings on Zoom, workshops, lectures and visits to rose gardens.

In HUNGARY the rose society celebrated 10 years since the rose garden in the Kecskemet town was created at the initiative of the president of the society, Hegedus Agoston.

In ROMANIA the Rose Society had several meetings and workshops over the past year. In June the Research Station in Cluj, where the national collection of roses is located, including the 50+ varieties bred by Romanian breeders, had an open day when the public visited the collection and met the members of the rose society.

In July, the customary Rose Festival was held in a village where the majority of rose nurseries of the country are located.

WFRS VICE PRESIDENT REPORTS

Sanya Rose Festival

On April 9th, the Sanya Rose Festival was held in Sanya Rose Valley. The Rose Garden at Sanya is the only rose garden on a tropical island in China. The rose garden was built in 2012. Since Sanya has the best beach and a tropical forest in China, it attracts a lot of tourists from the mainland China. People like to spend their holidays here, especially in winter time. The rose garden is situated near the famous beach and the tourists would choose the rose garden as a main destination so the rose garden attracts more than one million visitors every year. Mr Klevin Trimper, the chairman of the WFRS Liaison Committee came to Sanya and attended the opening ceremony. Kelvin was accompanied by Mr Zhang Zuoshuang, the President of Chinese Rose Society (CRS), and Ms Wang Bo, the Vice President of CRS. Kelvin was happy to see that the rose garden was well maintained. In the evening at the opening ceremony, a fantastic performance with a light and sky show was impressive. The Mayor of Sanya interviewed Kelvin Trimper and delegates from CRS.

International Rose Exhibition in Nanyang

Nanyang is the main production area for rose plants in China. The WFRS Regional Convention was held in Nanyang in 2019 and many rosarians who went to Nanyang had a good visit. In January of 2020 in Kolkata, India during the Regional Convention, I submitted the proposal of holding an international rose exhibition in Nanyang every year and I hoped that WFRS can officially support the exhibition by allowing the

name of WFRS as supporter to be used during the exhibition. Members of the Executive Committee who were in Kolkata approved my proposal. But after the Regional Convention, the Covid-19 pandemic came and lasted for three years. The International Rose Exhibition was planned but delayed and canceled again a few more times. At the end of 2022, China stopped the policy of strict sanitary checking and opened its border so international events can be held. The first international rose exhibition was held.

The rose exhibition was combined by a famous event called "Green Parade in China" which was supported by the State Administration of Forestry and Grassland, together with the Henan Provincial Government. The Chinese Rose Society was one of the organizers. WFRS officers Helga Bichet and Diane vom Berg attended the event. Since she got her visa late, Diane missed the opening ceremony and rose parade on the 28th morning. Helga attended the opening

ceremony and she made a speech on behalf of WFRS. In the evening, Diane joined the night gala performance. On the 29th, a symposium was held in Nanyang Agricultural Vocational College. Wang Hui, Ping Lim, Helga Bichet and others gave speeches. In the end, a panel discussion was held which I moderated the discussion. The topic of the discussion is on the protection of plant

varieties in China. For the rose exhibition, roses from other provinces and cities gathered in Nanyang. They were in different sections, including potted roses, rose plants, standard roses, and a new variety competition.

Award Ceremony of WFRS Garden of Excellence in Shanghai

During the 2022 Adelaide World Rose Convention, Everland Rose Garden from Korea and The Rose Garden at Shanghai - Chenshan Botanic Garden won the WFRS Garden of Excellence Award. We planned to invite our friends from WFRS to witness the award ceremony. I have been contacting Wook-Kyun Kim after the world convention.

We planned that we can

hold the ceremony on April 26th in Seoul, Korea, followed by the award to be held in Shanghai two or three days on 29th. Unfortunately, the proposal was not approved by Samsung HQ, the parent company of Everland. Wook-Kyun wrote to me that Everland had pursued this project vigorously in close collaboration with the rose society, however, this decision was thought to be due to the last global economic recession that had hit the electronic industry hard. According to a source here, Samsung's fourth quarter operating profit plunged 69% last year. In addition, the performance of semiconductors, smartphones, and home appliances, which represents a majority of this company's products, is not expected to rebound easily in the first half of the year. Wook-Kyun was very regrettable and felt sorry about the cancellation. After three-years' of the Covid-19 pandemic, the economy went into a recession all around the world. At this time, roses didn't seem to be more important.



Gardens at the Shanghai - Chenshan Botanic Garden

We went to Shanghai to attend the award ceremony of WFRS Garden of Excellence at Shanghai - Chenshan Botanic Garden. It was a nice, sunny day. The roses were in full bloom. A lot of visitors came to the garden with joy and happiness. Diane, Helga, Mr Zhang Zuoshuang and I attended the ceremony at the rose garden. As the award plaque didn't arrive, the host asked a local company to make a plaque according to the plan. But they enlarged the plaque and make it quite showy. Madame Jiang Zehui, the Chairman of the China Flower Association interviewed Diane and Helga before the ceremony and gave her books on bamboo for Diane and Helga.

Diane made a speech at the award ceremony. She praised the rose garden in her speech. At the end, Diane, Madame Jiang Zehui unveiled the award plaque. The rose garden is composed of two parts, the rose island and the rose garden around the tropical glasshouse. More than 1000 cultivars of roses are collected and displayed. And this is the fourth rose garden that has won the WFRS Award of Garden Excellence in China.

Meeting with Breeders' Club and the Seminar on Plant Variety Protection in Nanyang

In late August and early September, a meeting on the plant variety protection was held in Nanyang, as Nanyang is the largest production area of rose plants in China. It is very important for international rose breeders and Nanyang rose producers to communicate on how to upgrade their rose varieties. For many years, the rose producers used only out-of-date rose varieties as they don't know how to cooperate with international rose breeders. The WFRS Breeders' Club worked together with the Chinese Rose Society and held this meeting which lasted two days. On the first day, the main focus was to communicate among the rose breeders, rose producers, and the government bodies. Mr Long Sanqun, the director of Plant Variety Protection Office of State Administration of



Forestry and Grassland attended the meeting. He introduced the current situation and the policy of plant variety protection in China and pointed out some important issues on how to protect the rose varieties. Participants from the Breeders' Club include: Jean-Luc Pasquier, Chairman Breeders' Club, Gareth Thomas, David Austin Roses, Norman Kordes, Kordes Rosen, and Matthias Meilland, Meilland International. Alessandro Ghione, NIRP International, planned to attend but had to cancel his trip at the last minute. Mr Kelvin Trimper also attended the meeting. Participants from the Chinese Rose Society include Mr Zhang Zuoshuang, President, and Mr Zhao Shiwei, VP of WFRS and Secretary-General of CRS. Local officials include the Vice Mayor, the Director of Forestry Bureau, and others. At the end, the meeting reached a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) and stressed on how to cooperate in the future on protection of rose varieties and encourage new rose trials to be held in China. Also, it encourages Chinese rose breeders to take part in the Breeders' Club.

On September 1st, a seminar was held at the Nanyang Agricultural Vocational College. Mr Long Sanqun, Mr Zheng Yongqi, Mr Gareth Thomas, David Austin Roses and Matthias Meilland, Meilland International gave speeches. More than 200 people attended the seminar.

Other Events

This year, I attended several rose events, including the Rose Festival in Beijing in May, the Landscape Garden Rose Seminar in Guangzhou, and the Landscape Rose Exhibition at Shoufa Tianren Shengtai Landscape Co. In August, we helped Yanqing, Beijing to build a new rose garden in the Expo Garden. We invited people from Beijing, Jiangsu, Sichuan, Guangdong and Hebei to discuss on the possibility of building up the rose trails in China. Finally, we designated five rose gardens as the first rose trial gardens.



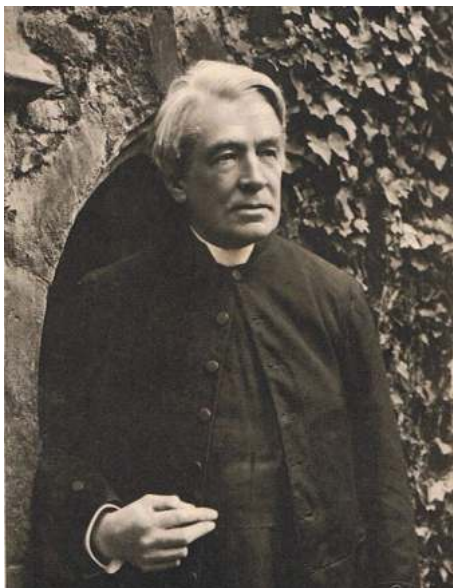

DEREK LAWRENCE, EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR PAYS HOMAGE TO THE ROSE KING

Our Executive Director, Derek Lawrence, wrote this excellent article on Dean Reynolds Hole who is considered the King of Roses, and was the catalyst for many international rose societies including those in Great Britain and the United States. The article was originally printed in the American Rose, bulletin of the American Rose Society.



Dean Hole Reynolds

It was a gloriously sunny February morning. I glanced up to the Cathedral spire, which shone like a magnificent beacon against the vibrant blue skyline. I paused, listening to the gentle birdsong that encompassed this grand medieval stone edifice. I stood in quiet contemplation; realising that my visit to Rochester in Kent was something sacred and exceptional. Entering the Cathedral, I headed towards the South Nave transept, where the memorial tomb of Samuel Reynolds Hole lay. Standing at the foot of the Dean's sculpture, with an elegant wreath of fine rose blooms circulating his feet; it became apparent of the deep respect and admiration that I developed for the Dean since my life-long passion for the rose began. In many respects, I share many of his interests as an avid writer; a fanatic of the dramatic arts; classical music and a total respect for animals. Like many other rosarians, his influence has had a profound impact on my life; and his observant, sometimes amusing writings have been instrumental in the development of the 'Queen of All Flowers' in modern times.

Samuel Reynolds Hole served the Church of England as Dean of Rochester from 1887 until his passing in 1904. During his tenure he revitalised the inner faith of worshipers and was influential in raising vast sums of capital to enable huge restoration of his beloved Cathedral. He exemplified the Victorian obsession of the great outdoors becoming a passionate sportsman and gardener. According to various sources which have chronicled his life, Reynolds Hole also had a passion for horses, the theatre, adored fine wines and had a wandering eye for beautiful ladies! To fully appreciate and

understand the mindset of this exceptional character of the rose world, I decided to journey to Caunton in Nottinghamshire in my quest to learn more about the man whom will forever be graciously known as the 'Rose King' – aptly named by his loyal friend, Lord Tennyson.



Arriving at the idyllic English village of Caunton, I felt that I'd drifted through the passages of time. In many respects, the suburb has retained its historical past, with rustic horse stables, fine English stone cottages and ale houses. However, my ultimate holy grail was to visit the Parish of St. Andrew's Church, where Hole became Vicar. As I entered the building, my attention was immediately drawn to a framed black and white photograph of the Dean, which hanged on one of the stone pillars. As I explored the church, I could almost feel the presence of this remarkable clergyman.

His eternal spirit seemed to warmly embrace and welcome me.

Compared to Rochester Cathedral, the church was tiny and rather humble, but nonetheless equally important. I was pleased to discover that parishioners fondly acknowledge the Dean's incumbent service of 43 loyal years in various prominent locations. There is a fine wooden frieze; he is also remembered in a brass plaque on the altar steps and in an elegant tablet over the priest's door. Just as I climbed up the narrow spiralling stone stairwell, towards the belfry; shafts of brightly coloured light greeted me that illuminated the usual dark steeple. The intense rays of the sun created a bright projected tapestry from the magnificent stained-glass window, which was commissioned to commemorate Dean Hole's extraordinary life.

He was born in Ardwick, near Manchester in 1819 and son of a renowned family brewing business. His parents purchased Caunton Manor, which is located near the church, to enable their four children to enjoy the delights of country living. Although he was Christened 'Samuel Reynolds', his family always referred to him as Reynolds. Little 'Reyn' explored the surrounding area with

eagerness, and soon developed a fascination for plants. He wrote: *"And then the first plant which I could call my own, the salvia, which I brought for sixpence from the nurseries near to our school! I have grown and shown a multitude of specimens in the greenhouse and the stove since then; I have won prizes of gold and cups of silver, but I have never exhibited nor seen others exhibit anything half so precious as that....no colour which could compare with its crimson flowers."*

On roaming around the grounds of St. Andrew's Church I stumbled upon Caunton Beck brook, which meanders beside the graveyard, where young Reynolds spent endless hours fishing. The schoolboy explored areas which contained ancient hedgerows, where he vainly searched for bird eggs. His adventurous spirit made him rather headstrong at times and on one occasion, in a moment of rage, he vindictively kicked and spat at his father during an altercation. Thankfully, the rather rebellious young Hole was a complete contrast to the rightful and spiritual man whom he'd eventually become known. Maybe his behavioural misgivings became a source of absolute inspiration to seek an ecclesiastical pathway? On graduating from Brasenose College, Oxford in 1844, he took Holy Orders and became curate and eventual vicar in his family's Parish. His strong and illuminating personality made him a popular figure amongst churchgoers. Whilst delivering sermons in the pulpit, he never spoke of anything which he hadn't had any personal experience of. Canon Hole was well-known for having a great sense of humour, making some of the congregation roar with laughter! However, he was also conscious of the abject poverty, starvation and subsequent illness which blighted an extensive number of communities in the Industrial North. He would speak of their plight and encourage active support from the parishioners. Reynolds Hole frequently visited these fractions to offer hope and comfort. He became a much-revered personality within workingmen's clubs. Indeed, it was a visit to a Nottingham miner's flower show which inspired him to found Britain's first-ever Grand National Rose Show.

It is well-documented that the first rose that truly captured his heart was 'd'Aguesseau' (Gallica) which he lovingly described: *"It glowed in the splendour of the setting sun with intense and burning crimson, the tints of vivid scarlet gleaming amid the purpler petals, as light in jewels or in dark red wine, that I shall never lose my first admiration."*

In his memoirs he wrote: *"There was a time when, although I had taken the degree of Bachelor of Arts, if I had gone for an examination into a school of botany and had been requested to write a description of the distinctive features of the peony, the dahlia and the rose, the most lenient examiner must inevitably have torn my paper into shreds; and yet as soon as I became overpowered by the conviction that the rose was the loveliest of all flowers and had steadfastly resolved to devote myself to its culture – from that time every effort which I made to acquire and apply information inspired me with a stronger determination and with confident hope".* As an aspiring, young vicar he soon discovered the joys that gardening can bring; once remarking that it was *'the purest of human pleasures, and the greatest refreshment to the spirit of man.'*

Hole intently began to study books about rose culture and enthusiastically perused the listings of varieties available in rose catalogues. It is recorded that in his pursuit to fully indulge himself in the delights of the *genus rosa* he planted a few hundred cultivars in the rambling grounds of Caunton Manor, which by the mid 1840's, had amassed to an extensive collection of five thousand bushes. The celebrated gardener, Gertrude Jekyll was a visitor to the gardens and years later, she enjoyed the rosy splendours of his Deanery in Rochester. He was renowned for hating angularity in the design of gardens preferring, throughout his long life, to the *"sweet contrived disorder"* of the English garden.

Like all rosarians, the Reverend Samuel Reynolds Hole, had his favourite roses. He greatly admired the Noisettes, 'Cloth-Of-Gold' and 'Maréchal Niel'. Another cultivar that he relished was 'Madame Alfred Carrière' which was also adored by Gertrude Jekyll.

Similarly, he was enraptured by the rampant beauty and charm of the Banksian Rose, introduced to Europe from China in 1796 that first reached the British Isles in 1807. For exhibition purposes, he recommended, 'Charles Lefévre', 'La France' and 'Safrano'. His all-time favourite was the climbing Tea Rose 'Gloire de Dijon'. It is an extremely fragrant creamy buff coloured rose with up to 40 petals. He trained it up the chancel wall of St. Andrew's Church. It grew luxuriantly and describing it with "two hundred flowers upon it in full simultaneous bloom." He once lovingly recalled that, "It is what cricketers call an all-rounder; good in every point for wall, arcade, pillar, standard, dwarf en masse, or as a single tree."

He became increasingly interested in exhibiting his blooms, because he wanted to share his passion and educate the general public on the sheer pleasures of growing roses. Exhibiting his roses at local Nottinghamshire village flower shows was just the foretaste of better things to come. The pinnacle of his skills was admirably highlighted when Reynolds Hole's roses won fourteen first prizes out of sixteen collections shown, including the first award for amateurs given by the Royal Horticultural Society at their Grand National Flower Show.

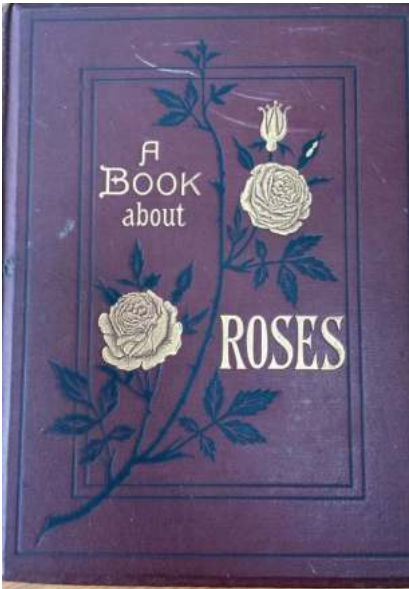
Although there was a cluster of specialist flower shows being held in respect of auriculas, carnations, chrysanthemums and dahlias, Hole was astonished that none were being held to honour the majesty of the rose. He wrote a letter to suggest that a Grand National Rose Show be held, which was published in the April 1857 edition of *The Florist* magazine. Referring later to this enterprise, he wrote: "And I must confess that, when I made this proposal to the world, I rather purred internally with self-approbation. I felt confident that the world would be please." After a number of weeks, he eventually received positive responses from the highly reputed rose nurserymen of Messrs Thomas Rivers, Charles Turner and William Paul whom pointed out that such a prestigious event would require meticulous planning. It was agreed that the event would be held the following summer.



The first Grand National Rose Show was held on 1st July 1858 at St. James's Hall, London. Large posters had been distributed throughout the Capital and subscriptions had come pouring in, enabling a schedule of prizes to the value of £156. On that momentous day, Hole arrived at 5.30 am after a considerable long journey of 120 miles. He must have felt a mixture of excitement and trepidation. The prizes were 36 Silver Cups engraved with roses and public admission was set at one shilling. As soon as the doors burst open, over 2,000 members of the public besieged the hall with immense elation. They were impressed by the dazzling fragrant blooms that even defied and defeated the foul smell from the River Thames, which at that time, overwhelmed the City. The triumph of this spectacle led to the next national show being held in Hanover Square the following year and in 1860, the show moved to the Crystal Palace where a record number of 16,000 people attended.

Reynolds Hole adored literature and became a prolific writer. He formed mutual friendships with publishers and was the author of several books. By far his most successful work was *A Book About Roses* which was published in 1868. The text includes three chapters which focus entirely on exhibition roses, which to show and how to show them. The book contains cultural tips, interspersed with humorous anecdotes; becoming a best seller. It remains a classic piece of work; its guidance is still relevant today and testament to Dean Hole's enduring passion for the rose.

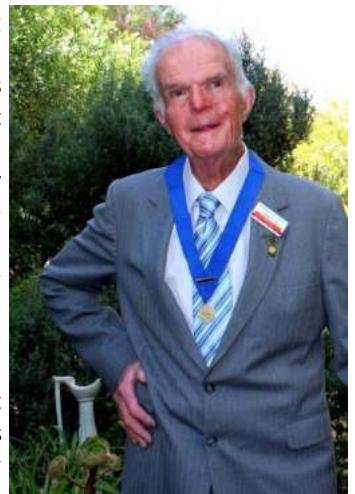
In an edition of *Gardeners' Chronicle* published in 1876, it details a conference between rose exhibitors and growers that was held at the Horticultural Club House in London on 9th December where it was proposed that a national rose society be formed. The Revd. Canon Samuel Reynolds Hole who presided, was installed as its first President. His fellow Church minister and cherished friend, the Revd. D. Honeywood D'ombrain was appointed Honorary Secretary. During his 28 years of presidency, Hole witnessed the continual popularity of the rose heighten, and the Society's Membership numbers during his term of Office rapidly increased to over 900. However, the most noted increase was in 1966, when the then Royal National Rose Society expanded to over 109,500 members.

The resounding success of this highly regarded British institution led to other countries such as The United States, Australia, South Africa and Germany forming their own national rose societies. Their committed determination paved the way to the founding of the World Federation of Rose Societies in London, during 1968. The organisation consists of 39 Member Countries and in its heyday represented 100,00 rose growers. Historically all national rose societies have been influential in actively promoting the attributes of the rose. The overseeing of various society international rose trials, has ensured that the expected high standards are met by the hybridisers who continue with their quest to breed the perfect rose.

Dean Hole was awarded the Victoria Medal of Honour from the Royal Horticultural Society in 1897 for his devoted service in promoting the sheer beauty and majesty of the rose. His health gradually began to deteriorate during 1904. He increasingly became breathless as he slowly climbed the steps of his beloved Rochester Cathedral. According to his congregation, he remained buoyant and in good spirits. The rose garden that he had created at the Deanery gave him joy and comfort during the last days of his life. He passed away peacefully in his sleep, aged 84 in the August of that year. The world had, indeed not only lost a fine Church Minister, but a morally upright character who simply adored roses. He left this planet leaving many ideological resources which remain in the very core of the rose world.



One of the abiding legacies in his honour, was the founding of the Dean Hole Medal in 1909 by the National Rose Society. This highly sought-after Award recognises rosarians who have contributed outstanding service for the benefit and advancement of the rose. This distinguished Award instantly became internationally acclaimed and highly respected. Since it was instituted, over 100 recipients have been bestowed with the Medal, which have included Queen Elizabeth, the Queen Mother, David Austin, Baroness Lily de Gerlache de Gomery, Dick Balfour, David Ruston, and Michael Marriott.



As the new Millennium dawned, it soon became apparent the world had become a digital domain, and the public's perception of the rose had slightly shifted. Like many other specialist societies, membership numbers of the RNRS

gradually diminished and this caused financial difficulties. Despite this, no one envisaged that the Society would announce its swift departure from the rose world in May 2017. However, undaunted, a band of rose enthusiasts; exhibitors and myself were summoned to a meeting held at a church hall in Pelsall in the West Midlands. As discussions ensued, it became apparent that the absolute passion and determination to create a new society with the same values, which our forefathers had nurtured long ago still burned. 140 years earlier, Reynolds Hole had presided around a similar table, to deliberate the possibility of the birth of a national rose society. A tingling sensation ran down our spines, with the feeling that the spirit of this great man had returned to prompt us to retain his foresight and great vision. With nothing but sheer gumption, The Rose Society UK was formed. There was an

increasing interest in the new society and membership numbers began to flourish. In 2019, it was decided to revive the Dean Hole Medal to enable it to be continually recognised as a highly prestigious award for the benefit and enjoyment of 21st Century rosarians.

For many decades, the Rose Society has acknowledged Hole's profound influence to encourage amateur gardeners to exhibit their roses, with the introduction of the Dean Hole Challenge Classes. The exhibitor who is the overall victor at all of the Society's yearly shows is declared as the rightful winner of the 'Dean Hole Championship' and presented with the Dean Hole Silver Challenge Cup. In 2013, fledgling exhibitor Neil Duncan from Hampshire; was presented with the trophy, and has won it consecutively every year since then. It's a remarkable achievement, and testimony to Neil's sheer skills as a master showman.

As I continued to amble around the pathway of St. Andrew's Church tranquil graveyard, I began to reflect on what a remarkable life this fine gentleman had led. Standing by the granite cross, which bears his name and where he is laid to rest, I paused respectfully in quiet thought. When breeder William Paul named a rose in his honour, Dean Hole responded by saying, *"I did not think I should live to be described as a splendid maroon dashed with crimson, large and globular, generally superb."* Reynolds Hole's legacy lingers

on amongst rosarians the world over. His boundless energy, tireless devotion and eternal spirit remains in the heart of every rose garden: enriching our lives with joy and happiness, unbeknown to anyone not yet acquainted with the infinite charms of the rose.

At the 15th WFRS International Heritage Rose Conference, held in Belgium during June, the Federation had the honour to have the presence of the current Dean of Rochester Cathedral, the Very Reverend, Dr Philip Hesketh. I had the absolute privilege to welcome this fine gentleman onto the stage. In his inspirational speech, Dr Hesketh spoke of Dean Hole's immeasurable achievements and accomplishments in the world of roses. He reflected on how Hole is still lovingly remembered and highly regarded by many thousands of rosarians around the world. With sheer enthusiasm, the Dean announced the formation of an exciting project to create a fitting permanent tribute to Dean Hole to be located at Rochester Cathedral in Kent, which will include a museum and befitting rose garden. It is hoped that immense support for the project, will ensure Dean Hole's legacy will be continued to be celebrated by future generations of rose lovers. Details of which will be published in future editions.
